Proud to be a local family-owned business

This remarkable story of local resident Bill Walshe was written and completed by his son, Trevor Walshe, the night before they marched together on ANZAC Day in Tuncurry, 25 April 2024. Bill served in the Royal Australian Navy as a Signalman during WW2.

Signalman Bill Walshe RAN 1941 – 1945

Bill was born 22nd January 1925. He is now 99 years old. Despite the ravages of memory loss, recollection of his war service and that of his parents and brothers remains clear.

Bill always referred to his family as a family affected by war. He held a deep, abiding sense that the mothers and wives - those left behind, suffered as much as those they farewelled when the call to duty was sounded. He spoke often and with sadness of his mother (in his own words): "...who died a sick and broken woman, prematurely aged - a victim of war if ever there was one and yet she never heard a shot fired or a bomb explode. She suffered when her husband, just months after their marriage embarked for Gallipoli then the Western front, away from his young bride for four long years only to return a different person, wounded and permanently sick from the effects of mustard gas. Then, twenty years later suffered again when her three sons enlisted in the Second World War". Bill, perennially modest, countenances no comparison of his experience of war to that of his parents or his big brother's four years as a POW in Japan".

Bill joined the Navy six months after his 17th birthday. He was one of 30 new recruits designated to become Convoy Signalman after a three month crash course in visual signals at

Flinders Naval Depot. These youngsters, many others as young as Bill and only a couple older than nineteen were destined to work on convoy merchant ships plying the dangerous waters of the Atlantic with much needed supplies for the UK and Russia. This was during

the peak of the U-boat peril when the life expectancy of sailors in that theatre was at times as low as 30 days.

When Japan entered the war late in 1941 everything changed. The bombing of Darwin made real the threat of invasion from the north so Prime Minister Curtin defiantly brought the troops home to defend Australia. As was the case for Britain, our sea lanes had to be kept open and our country transformed into a vast base from which Allied forces could mount a defence. To succeed in this strategy merchant ships became the vital link as the carriers of troops, military equipment, food and raw materials, indeed everything required for an island nation's survival. This is the theatre into which Bill and his mates were thrust.

In his book titled 'Signalman Bill's Story: Convoys Signals Pacific War' (see book cover on left) he explains the need for convoys and the role they played to supply a world at war (and I quote): To put large numbers of vessels together on the high seas is unavoidably hazardous. They must keep in station relative to each other, must maintain uniform speeds, must alter course together, must share current weather conditions and be kept fully informed of imminent or potential dangers like submarine or air attack, and must know precisely what to do in the event of such attack. In effect, they must be in constant communication with each other and with their naval escorts. But there was a problem. Wireless telegraphy was not permitted as that could be intercepted by a vigilant enemy on the prowl and listening for any and all ship movement. So the only means of communication available to a convoy was visual signals: morse code using lights and semaphore in the form of masthead and hand held flags. Which created another problem. The

escort vessels – the fighting ships, all had the requisite number of highly trained signalmen as part of their complement. The merchant ships were the opposite - with no personnel trained in naval communication, let alone with an understanding of convoy procedures.

So it was that Bill and his 29 fellow recruits spent their war service as RAN personnel aboard merchant ships. Bill was sent on untold assignments, joining convoys wherever dangers were deemed most likely to occur. Frequently on one ship for just days, the next a week, at times a month before being whisked away for yet another convoy with a different destination. He was aboard 40 to 60 ships in those frantic years between 1941 and 1945,

Where to next for improved local healthcare services?

On Wednesday 17th April, at a Midcoast Council Public Forum, a representative from the Manning Great Lakes Community Health Action Support Group (MGLCHAG) spoke in support of a motion put forward by Cr Kathryn Bell which sought to support the petition, signed by 11.750 people, or 13% of the population of Myall Lakes Electorate. The motion is lengthy, as is the presentation to Council by our representative, so what follows is a summary of the



- To acknowledge that our health services are in crisis
- To recognised that financial responsibility for health services lay with the State Government
- Acknowledge their role to support and advocate on behalf of the community.
- To strongly support the contents of the
- To write to all State Government stakeholders, including but not limited to, The Premier, Minister for Health, MidCoast Council's four State Members advising them of

The presentation by our representative stated:

- That only \$40 million of the \$140 million allocated in 2018 had been spent.
- As a result of a 30% increase in construction costs Stage 2 could not be completed as per the initial plan and we will be left with a scaled down version and still have no idea what will be included and what will be omitted.
- Manning Base Hospital (MBH) has less than 140 beds but, using the government's own
- That the Emergency Department (ED) must compete with elective surgical patients as well as ICU/HDU/CCU for ward beds leaving patients stranded in ED well beyond the target of 4 hours, sometimes 24 hours or more
- That as a result of the above, beds were often unavailable for new patients arriving in ED which leads to lengthy waiting times and
- That the hospital is in a disgraceful state with mould and damp on some walls and ceilings.

• That MBH is under-resourced in comparison to its peer hospital. As an example, Tamworth Hospital which is a higher peer group and saw only an extra 17 patients per day, has 35 nursing shifts per day and had 1200 more ambulance arrivals in 2023.

• That a lack of emergency services in Forster/ Tuncurry and Bulahdelah impact on the ED at MBH further increasing workload and that we need a Multipurpose Service in Bulahdelah and an Urgent Care Centre and public beds in Forster/Tuncurry

The motion was supported by a number of Councillors at the Council meeting later that day and was passed unanimously.

Some interesting statistics were presented by Cr Sandilands: Coffs Harbour, with a population of 80,000 has 350 beds, Port Macquarie, with a population of 86,000 has 228 beds whilst, as previously mentioned MBH has less than 140 beds for a population of 96,000.

The forces for good are gathering, slowly yes, but inexorably. The petition to complete Manning Base Hospital upgrades will be presented to our local state representative, Tanya Thompson at Parliament House on May 9th and debated in Parliament in June.

May the force be with us!

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

Items of interest - 17 April Council meeting

Mayoral minutes

Several Mayoral Minutes were presented. The first called on Council to adopt a principle of ensuring all operations are efficient, effective and lean and that priority areas be identified for service reviews in the Deliver Progran and Operation Plan (DPOP) for 2024-25.

The Mayoral Minute also requires the General Manager to undertake a review that benchmarks corporate services against other local NSW Councils to provide a comparison and identify improvement opportunities for consideration in future service reviews.

The second called for endorsement of regional motions developed through the Hunter Joint Organisation for lodging to the National General Assembly of Local Government to be held in Canberra from 2-4 July.

Notice of motions from Councillors

- Councillor Paul Sandilands motion to waive all cemetery fees for stillborn infants up to the age of six years of age was supported by
- Councillor Dheera Smith moved a motion to employ more rangers to police 4WDs on beaches. An amended motion was supported by Councillors to workshop the issue.
- Councillor Kathryn Bell's motion for Council to support a petition from the community (fighting for improved services at the Manning Rural Referral Hospital) was supported by all
- A motion calling for Council to complete a disability parking review from Councillor Katheryn Stinson was supported by all Councillors.

Management of aquatic centres and pools

Council will now enter into negotiations with prospective operators for the management of the Taree and Forster Aquatic Centres following the closing of tenders. [See summary of agenda for Council Meeting on 1 May at the end.]

While the meeting formally rejected the tenders, approval has been given to enter into negotiations with tenderers to come to an agreement to operate the two centres.

The successful tenderer will take over management of the sites directly from the YMCA. Any prepaid memberships or Learn-toswim lessons will continue to be honoured.

The meeting also resolved to open tenders from private operators, community groups or small operators for the management of the Wingham Memorial Swimming Pool and Tea Gardens Swimming Pool.

The running of the Wingham and Tea Gardens Pools by small operators or community groups has the potential to provide a reduced management fee and improve the level of service and customised approach to the unique requirements of each community

As a back-up option, Council will receive optional prices from operators tendering for the Manning and Great Lakes sites providing an option should a small operator or community group not be found.

NAIDOC funding

Four applicants will benefit from the recent round of NAIDOC funding.

Gloucester Worimi First Peoples Aboriginal Corporation, Purfleet Taree Local Aboriginal Land Council, Forster Local Aboriginal Land Council and Tea Gardens, Hawks Nest Aboriginal Reference Group in conjunction with Worimi Local Aboriginal Land Council/Murrook Cultural Centre will all receive \$4000 towards their events.

Water and systems monthly performance report

Councillors accepted the report which highlighted the continued high performance of the department. Compliance remains at 99.7% with no new exceedances. Wastewater compliance sits at 100%.

Water supply conditions remain favourable with predictions of median autumn rainfall and little risk that water restrictions will be

The team received 311 customer requests for the month with 99% complete within the customer service standards.

The second round of leak detection is now complete with over 500 km of mains surveyed. A total of 158 leaks were found within Council's network. Rectifying these leaks will save 7.4 million litres of water

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Extra service fees in Aged Care needs reviewing



A motion put forward by MidCoast Council Deputy Mayor Cr Alan Tickle, at the April 17th Council Meeting, calls for the non-regulated "extra services fees" imposed by many aged

care facilities to be on the national agenda at the July 4th Australian Local Government Conference. The motion from Cr Tickle was unanimously supported by MidCoast Councillors.

The motion calls for a review by the Government on the practice of many aged care facilities charging nonregulated additional service fees, and draws attention to the complexity of the assessment of means tested fees and the conflicting method of assessment for

Cr Tickle, who is a Financial Planner by profession and an accredited Aged Care Financial Adviser, said that if a person of low means was forced to pay the basic care fee of \$61.96 per day plus an additional service fee of \$25 per day, which is not uncommon in our local government area, then the amount that the resident is called upon to pay often exceeds the single rate pension and may result

The basic fee and the additional services fee, is on top of other potential fees such as means tested fees and daily accommodation

"I can understand why aged care facilities have had to cover increases in their operation costs and have resorted to applying compulsory nonregulated fees, but I can't condone refusing to un-pack those fees so that only additional services required are paid for."

"For example, I suggest that a person with dementia paying for pay TV when they can't operate a remote control or have no interest in watching TV is totally unacceptable. That is a common complaint I am hearing, and it is widespread."



More 'fast & ultra-fast' **EV** charging bays for Forster

soon have access to more 'fast and ultra-fast' electric vehicle charging bays that will allow drivers to fully charge their cars in about 60

Stockland recently announced a long-term strategic partnership with Ampol, to roll out one of the biggest Australian shopping centre networks of AmpCharge fast and ultra-fast electric vehicle (EV) charging infrastructure.

The EV charging infrastructure will be installed across 16 of Stockland's town centres (including Forster) over the coming 18 months, with the number of charging bays per centre ranging from six to 12 based on current customer demand. Each AmpCharge charger can service two cars, providing one car up to 150kW or two cars up to 75kW when charging simultaneously.

In 2023, EV purchases in Australia more than doubled from 2022, with the total number of

• Do not place the following in the pickup asbestos, chemicals or medicines/fuel or oil (or items containing fuel or oil)/ batteries or gas bottles/smoke detectors or fire extinguishers These 'problem waste' items are not allowed in your kerbside bins but can be dropped off for free all year at your nearest Waste Management Centre.

from battered old tramp steamers to sleek new ocean liners carrying troops. Big ships, small ships, armed ships, ammunition ships, cargo ships and tankers low in the water, 'sitting ducks' struggling under the weight of cargo There was the difficulty of finding a berth in crowded ships only to sling a hammock in the hold, the meeting of another skipper and crew, new signalman and learning their routines, what the hours of duty would be, where they were headed and when and where they would disembark. Always on the move, always something new and different with each assignment. Always the ever present awareness of danger from an enemy watching, listening, ready to strike at any moment.

There were the long hours on watch, staring into the sun through binoculars, the tiredness, the dangers, the fears, the unexpected, the excitement, the hard times, the good times, the friendships made and the mates lost. The cold, the wet, the shivering and then the heat – the unbelievable heat of the tropics in summer at night in ships that were blacked out and sealed like tombs. And then of course there was the sea. Calm one moment, tempestuous the next. Sparkling and serene today, ugly, menacing and cruel the next. These are Bill's memories of those dark days of war and hardship.

Bill remembers clearly the morning of 15th August 1945 when he received the signal:

'To: Pacific Fleet From: Commander in Chief, Pacific Operations Area, Advanced HQ.

Communique Number 467. Released at 0200 GMT 15th August – follows

Orders have been issued to the US Pacific Fleet

Under the command of C in C USPF and Pacific Ocean area, to cease offensive Operations against the Japanese.

It was his job to hand this historic signal to his skipper. He could actually hear the cheers from ships nearby, and it took only seconds before

the cheering erupted from all quarters within his own ship.

But the next signal received brought them all quickly back to reality with its import and irony, and remains just as fixed in his memory. Short and to the point, it read:

'It is likely that Kamikazes will attack the fleet as a final fling. Any ex-enemy aircraft attacking the fleet is to be shot down – in a friendly manner.'

The war was over. They were going home.

Uncles remembered at Seal Rocks Service

At the ANZAC Day Service in Seal Rocks, organised by Katie and Dan Toney at Reflections, Aunty Janice read out a sonnet written by

Aunty Janice said she felt very sad reading it out loud as it reminded her of when she was younger, holding hands with her mother, Vera Poulson (nee Simon), at the Anzac Marches. Her mother would have tears rolling down her cheeks thinking about what happened to her two brothers. The brothers, Robert (Bob) Simon and Toki Simon (Aunty Janice's two uncles in the photo) were soldiers in WW2 with long records of war service. They were treated very badly when they returned home to Forster. There was no flag flying for them and they were not allowed to go into the local clubs or pubs with their army mates at the time.

Aunty Janice said it still hurts, and her reading of the sonnet was dedicated to her mother for when sons went to war. Growing up, Janice knew of a lot of older women who volunteered at this time also

Although it was a sad occasion, Aunty Janice said the Anzac Service was very beautiful. This year Aunty's friends Karyn and Emma each rode a horse on the Number One Beach with Karyn holding an Aboriginal flag and Emma an Australian flag. (See horse photo on page 11.)

"Even though it was overcast and cloudy, it was a beautiful outlook onto the beach. We saw a pod of dolphins and eagles while the two horses rode up the beach at dawn," said Auntv Janice. "The number of people who came was larger than last year."





William (Toki) Simon - 2/3 Battalion, 6th


Division. Toki was one of the famous Rats at Tobruk and was on the Kokoda Trail. He served in Syria, Egypt and New Guinea. At one stage he was wounded, then recovered and went back to war. Victor Simon (his son) was in the 6th Regiment D company who fought in the Battle of Long Tan in Vietnam, 1966.

Robert (Bob) Simon - 2nd/18th Regiment. Bob served in Malaya and became a prisoner of war (POW) in Changi. He was sent to Bara Camp which was known as the Death Camp. He survived and came home. By Mary Yule

Book Review

The Rare Metals War

The Rare Metals War by Guillaume Pitron, published in 2024, is an updated version of that published in 2018. It describes the tension between our efforts to harness renewable energy and the damage, environmentally, economically, and strategically, in achieving

Our societies have outsourced to remote countries the environmental damage caused by mining and processing of these minerals. Developing countries, desperate for the income provided, even as they come under Chinese sway, are complicit in that damage as we are.

More particularly, our consumption-based lifestyle has made us hostage to China as the manufacturer for the world and major processor of these rare metals that are central to so much of modern technology. Pitron notes that western countries, especially France and the US, concerned about the environmental consequences of that processing and the cheapness of letting China do it, proceeded to close both their mines and their manufacturing capabilities. China now has taken control of the rare earths market (p 129) and consumes 80% of rare earth oxides produced globally. The West has been lulled into indifference.

We are slowly waking up to our strategic dependence and vulnerability to economic pressure but re-establishing its capabilities is

a slow process not least because it requires environmental safeguards and costs in ensuring them. These metals require very large amounts of ore body to be mined to obtain a few kilos. Moreover, that dependence on Chinese supply has resulted in the transfer of intellectual property and technological edge to them in order to obtain these processed minerals.

Every time one puts a fridge magnet up, or uses a mobile phone, or draws power from solar panels and wind turbines and batteries, one is using in very small amounts some rare earth metals. They are critical to communications and computers, guided weapons, and military capability. For example, erbium is critical for long-distance fibre-optic communication (think internet), neodymium, dysprosium, and samarium are critical for the permanent magnets central to small, efficient electric motors. And, we are only going to use more of

Are there solutions to this conundrum? Pitron notes the fundamental inconsistency (p 189) in wanting a clean energy future but ignoring the dirty side in getting there. With global metal consumption growing at 3-5% per year, we will over the next generation consume more metals and minerals than in the last 70,0000 years. (p 162). He emphasises that we must re-use, re-cycle, and extend the useful life of much that we consume – the circular economy – batteries are a good example. Bringing back the

Based on the actual investigation reports on the ferry, it's sinking and the rescue efforts. Three countries were involved in the investigation, Finland the ferry sunk in Finnish waters and a Finnish company previously had made modifications to the vessel). Estonia

(An Estonian company was operating the ferry, and the ferry was registered in Estonia). Sweden (A Swedish company were part owners of the ferry, and the ferry was bound for Stockholm together with a largest number of deaths on the ferry were Swedish citizens). Another country involved outside of the investigation was Germany, the country that built the vessel.

Throughout the enquiry each of the four countries tries to blame each other and this political intrigue, along with the storylines of the survivors, makes for an interesting series.

3. Babylon Berlin: 2017 - present 4 seasons. SBS (German with subtitles)

The series is set in Berlin from 1929 and mainly centres around Gereon Rath a young police inspector and Charlotte Ritter who works in the police head office. The storyline involving history, crime and violence tracking through the dark and violent times of Berlin which has become the epicentre of political and social changes in the Golden Twenties. Babylon Berlin is a lavishly produced series - in fact it is the most expensive non-English-speaking series ever made and definitely worth watching.

Graham & April's Birthday 4WD Bash

How many people get to drop everything and go on a real outback road adventure for days at

Local resident Graham McKay has raced and volunteered in many charity car rallies with his mates over the years. This year is different. To celebrate his and his daughter's birthdays, the pair are joining a 4WD adventure that will travel through an extremely remote area in the Simpson Desert on the border of NSW and Queensland. Graham wants to show April some amazing places that only a few people get to

This 10 day adventure involves around 30 people in a convoy of up to 15 4WDs. It has been organised by David Metcaff who was asked to run something different in 2024 by previous competitors of the Kidney Kar Rally (which stopped operating in 2023). Although it is an off-road challenge, the adventurers will enjoy more relaxed starts than the official car rallies and plan to be on the road by 8am most mornings. Any money raised on the trip will be given to Angel Flight Australia whose volunteers organise remote flights for people living in the outback to specialised medical treatments. In the past these drivers have raised money with raffle nights at towns along the way.

The 4WD convoy begins at Birdsville after a 'start dinner' that happens to be on Graham's birthday, the 28th of April. From there, they will travel the 500km on the French Line to camp one night at the Delhousie Springs Campground in the Witjira National Park where there are hot natural artesian springs to soak in after this challenging route.

There are 12,000 red sand dunes petween Birdsville and Delhousie Springs. Every 4WD must have a 2.5 netre sand flag on the roof. This for vehicles to see each other when driving over a sand dune from opposite directions. The first driver then radios back to say 'all clear' for the drivers behind. Some sand dunes are quite steep and the flags are

From Delhousie Springs they will drive to a roadhouse nearby at Mt Dare, which is the last place to stock up and refuel before following the less-travelled Madigan Line (named after Dr Cecil Madigan who made this journey by camel on a scientific expedition in 1939). The 4WD convoy plans to drive around 80 to 100km a day on this part of the journey, and Graham and April will be 'swagging it' under the stars every night. The Madigan Line is a 920 km long loop back to Birdsville and extremely remote with no towns along the way. They will only see the occasional camel or

The 4WD convoy hope to get back to Birdsville on the 8th or 9th May for a 'finish dinner'.

Graham then wants to show April the famous Waltzing Matilda Centre in Winton, 740km from Birdsville, which houses a museum. exhibition spaces and an art gallery. Winton is also known as the 'Australia's Dinosaur Capital' and the pair will spend time exploring gigantic dinosaur footprints at the Lark Park Conservation Quarry, 115km southwest of Winton. These are huge distances, but Graham said they may never get back there again and really wants to make the most of this special trip with his daughter

Graham said all the 4WDs are prepared. In their group they have a technician, paramedic, ex-military, as well as people experienced in

navigation and motor mechanics. Graham believes the weather should be good with daily temperatures of 29 to 34 degrees and cold nights (he is taking is thermal underwear!) He has packed baked beans for breakfast, canned fish and bread for lunch, and Cryovac packed steaks for dinner. He said they will be hungry for greens by the end of it.

Graham and April left on Anzac Day (after April's recent birthday) to meet the rest of the crew at Birdsville, which is around 1000km from Forster. They plan to drive 400 to 600km a day to reach this designated start of their 4WD

Mail Service

There has been a postal service in Forster since 1st October, 1872. It was not a complete service for when John Wylie Breckenridge applied for the postal facilities he was granted a minimum service which drew an annual salary of 20 pounds (\$40). The office was conducted in Beckenridge's Post Office Store under the name of John Wylie Breckenridge and opened on 1st October, 1872. Henry Miles, house carpenter and William Baird ships carpenter, both of Forster, stood as sureties for the Post Office. Mail was delivered weekly by Charles Dee Jnr. of Myall River who rode horseback between Myall River and Forster via McRae's Mill, Burraduc and Bungwahl Flat, a distance of 8 kilometers for an annual of fee of 120 pounds

The residents of Forster and North Forster (Tuncurry) used the post office at Forster until

Unwin, submitted a report to the authorities. He said: "I consider an office at North Forster is necessary as at the present the residents have to cross a dangerous lake to the Post Office." The Post Office was opened at the back of John Wright's store and Ms. Susan O'Beirne was in charge. Confusion resulted in the postal field with Forster and North Forster so on 1st June 1899, permission was given to change the name to Tuncurry,

1899. However, in 1899

Telegraph Service

The need for rapid transmission of messages was most important to those engaged in the shipping business, thus sufficient traffic of such nature warranted the erection of a telegraph line between Bungwahl Flats (later Bungwahl)

The single line was completed in 1882, the total line was 34.4 km and cost 1,558 pounds (\$3,116). Telegraphy required a trained operator with experience in the use of Morse Code and so on 1st May, 1882, Pelham Henry Ellar Aldrich was appointed telegraphist to the new telegraph station at Forster. When Pelham Aldrich on 1st May, 1882 sent the first telegram, it was from a separate office from the Post Office. This office was situated in what was previously the residence of David White, Shipbuilder. When Mr. White died, his widow rented the building to the Postal Authority, and it was in this building the postal business was amalgamated with the Telegraph business and began operating as a Post Office on 1st June,


Up to this date postal services had been handled through Breckenridge Post Office Store with Hugh Breckenridge as Postmaster. The authorities decided to combine both post and telegraph facilities and on 1st June, 1882 this became Forster's Post Office and Telegraph Office under the direction of Aldrich.

During the year Pelham handled 5,520 letters posted out, 827 telegraph messages, 117 money orders issued and 27 money orders paid. The total revenue for the year amounted to 252 pounds (\$504). The postmaster was paid 58 pounds

(\$116) for postal work and 150 pounds (\$300) for the telegraph duties. He continued as postmaster until 1906 when he was transferred to Werris

A new office on Lot 1, Section 2, corner Beach and Wallis Streets resumed from J. Breckenridge was built by Albert von Ehlefeldt for 838 pounds (\$1,676) and was completed in April 1902


It was not until 19th June, 1949 that it became a full time service and became an official post



Telephone Service

Eventually the telephone took over the transmission of telegrams and the services of a telegraphist were no longer needed.

On 8th June, 1910, a telephone exchange was opened with R.R. Breckenridge, C Bowers, Albert von Ehlefeldt and Sons as subscribers.

Left: Forster Post Office was built in 1902

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

The NSW surf season officially ends next weekend on Sunday, 28 April 2024, following which there will not be life savers watching over beach goers on weekends and public holidays. Some major cities may still employ life

The difference between lifesavers and lifeguards is that lifesavers are volunteers who are part of surf lifesaving clubs. Lifeguards are paid professionals who work for the Australian Lifeguard Service, local council or an alternate service provider

The six Lower North Coast Surf Life Saving Branch (LNCSLSB) clubs - Crowdy Head, Taree-Old Bar, Black Head, Forster, Cape Hawke and Pacific Palms - will each mark the end of the surf season with a 'Newcastle Permanent Lowering of the Flags' ceremony. Some clubs will also conclude the season with frivolity such as the Forster Surf Club's Formal Run-Swim-Run in ball gowns and suits.

No club in the LNCSLSB is meeting the average number of proficient patrolling members and all clubs are in need of recruits. In fact, there is concern regarding a serious lack of patrolling personnel in many clubs on the coastline north of Newcastle - Brunswick Heads, Minnie Water-Wooli, Red Rock-Corindi, Bellinger Valley-North

Beach, Nambucca Heads, Haven, Tea Gardens-Hawks Nest, and our LNCSLSB clubs Crowdy Head, Taree-Old Bar and Pacific Palms.

These clubs are all listed on the SLS **NSW Patrol Support** Program which is a register on which individuals or groups from other surf clubs volunteer to travel to provide respite to overworked fellow

Despite the challenges that the shortages imposes, all of our local branch clubs have still managed to meet their patrol commitments but this has entailed significant sacrifices for club members and their families

Joining a NSW Surf Life Saving Club offers a multitude of benefits beyond just enjoying the surf. Firstly, it provides a sense of belonging to a community bonded by a shared passion for ocean safety and enjoyment. These clubs foster camaraderie, friendships, and a supportive environment where members can grow personally and socially

There is a role for everyone in the water and on the shore - rescuing swimmers in distress, patrol captains, junior surf lifesavers, trainers and assessors, first aid officers, advanced resuscitation officers, spinal and emergency care, radio operators, observation drone pilots administration and support staff, education and community outreach, equipment maintenance, event management, search and rescue teams, youth leaders and fundraisers.

A check of our local club's Facebook page or website, or even a chat with current club members will provide information.

Big Heart Hike supports Forster Surf Club

Now in its eighth year, a total of 150 online entries were received for the Big Heart fundraiser conducted by Brian and Lori Belic. This total is 30 more than the previous record

This was the first year from which funds have been directed to the Forster Surf Life Saving Club as the previous years have been in support of the Forster Volunteer Marine Rescue's successful purchase of a new boat.

This 2024 event will result in about \$6,000 being added to the Forster Surf Club Building Committee coffers which are being accumulated in order to fund the interior fitout of the new structure.

Participants this year, with the first 100 nominations dressed in yellow T-shirts, could walk or run and could complete all or any sections of the course. Encouragement from passers-by, car horn honking and calls of "Go the yellow Wiggles", were common

Idyllic weather saw participants facing the starters 'gun' from Black Head Surf Club at sunrise 6 am on Sunday, April 14. Their journey traversed the length of Tuncurry's Nine Mile Beach before a barbeque breakfast on Forster Main Beach. From there the walk continued along the Bicentennial Walkway to Bennetts Head, down the sand dune onto One Mile Beach and on to the Cape Hawke Surf Club. The final out-leg went past Burgess Beach, through the challenging Booti Booti National Park track and up to the Cape Hawke Lookout.

From atop the lookout tower, there were voices of amazement when participants viewed how far they had come from Black Head. This left a 7.5 km walk back to Cape Hawke Surf Club for refreshments and re-hydration.

The first participant to complete the entire course, Karmen Reardon, did so in under 4 hours. Fast walkers, on their first passing through the Cape Hawke Surf Club check point were amazed to see Karmen finishing. One

comment was, "I am not surprised that Karmen has already finished - she's a machine."

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Meanwhile, the final finisher to complete all 28 km did so in 8 hours – with breaks to attend to the needs of her young children who were being driven as a 'support team' by her

For the past two years, the Belic's have said "No more!" However, enheartened by the success of this year's event, Brian has already relented somewhat by saying that a 2025 Big Heart Hike might have a different route. 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Two gold at Australian Age Championships

"He did well. He wanted it - it was his goal," said Grant Fleming, father of 17-year-old Joel Fleming who won two gold medals at the recent National Age Championships in the Gold Coast.

"I had a feeling he would do well in the 50m freestyle final and I actually ordered professional photos, for the first time, before loel's final!"

Grant said they had a relaxing time leading up to the Championships and Joel was feeling confident after his first gold medal in the relay.

"We camped nice and close to the Aquatic Centre on the Gold Coast. Swimming NSW looked after him well and provided him with some physio when Joel felt something in his back. On the Monday (8 April), Joel swam for NSW in the 16 to 17 year-old 4 by 50m relay. He swam the second leg and moved the team from second place to first place. They stayed in

first position and got the gold medal. This was the same team as two years ago, which is remarkable as vou need to have one of the four fastest times in NSW to make the team. They are really good friends and enjoyed

swimming together again."

"This win was important for Joel and the other swimmers in the NSW team. It gave them

Local swimmer Chris Sefton (pictured above) only took up swimming at age 41. Thirteen years later she is regularly competing at Aussie Masters and winning medals. On April 13 and 14 this year, she won a gold medal for the 50m (41:52) and 100m (1:33:89) breaststroke in the 50 to 54 age group at the Masters Swimming NSW Long Course Championships held in Sydney.

Two gold at NSW Aussie Masters

"With Aussie Masters, it's a nice surprise to find out how you place after everyone has swum in the same event," said Chris.

"They move through the different swimming races quickly. It is very well organised."

Chris explains that Aussie Master swim meets are held around Australia and anyone over 18 can compete for their club at interclub, state and national events. There are so many swimmers competing

that you are grouped into races based on your submitted times. This means you are swimming with people who have the same time as you but can be women and men of different ages. Placings in each age group are determined by ranked times after everyone has swum in that event. Most Aussie Masters meets have around 12-16 different race events.

Aussie Masters has the motto 'Fitness, Friendship and Fun!' Their website says, 'it's about staying in shape, meeting like-minded fitness buddies and enjoying the experience.

Chris said, "Competitors compete against themselves really. When I first started, I was worried how I would go against other swimmers, but everyone only worries about themselves in the races. It's really friendly with a wide range of abilities. There are people racing in their 90s."

Chris belongs to the Myall Masters Swimming Club, based in Tea Gardens, who were the closest club when she started. She can't get there very often but trains regularly in her hometown of Forster.

"When I first started swimming, Peter Sanders was the adult coach at the Great Lakes Y and taught me how to swim breaststroke. In the last few years, I have been coached by Ged

Crowe. They have both been great support. I'm lucky also to have had wonderful support and help from the Myall Masters club coaches, in particular Leon Bobako."

Pete Sander, Head Coach at Great Lakes Y said, "Christine is a beautiful breaststroker. I helped her out with her diving and swimming skills for a few years. It's great to see her keep up training and do so well at Aussie Masters."

Chris said, "My next swimming event is the Masters Swimming National Championship in Darwin, coming up soon in May. I'm in the 50m, 100m and 200m breaststroke and the 50m freestyle. That way I will have a race on every day of the 4-day pool competition."

"I hope to do as well as I can. After the races my family is having a camping holiday at Kakadu. We've never been there. This is why I was keen to race in Darwin."
