Pink's Family Carnival - 40 years in Tuncurry

The Pink Family Carnival is celebrating its 40th year at Tuncurry with founders Charlie Pink and the late George Pink.

Shelley Easey (nee Pink) recalls the history-

"We held our first Carnival in Tuncurry in December 1984. The original site was on 2 blocks of land owned by the late Ted O'Brien of Forster and the Taree RSL Club. The vacant sand blocks were located on the corner of South Street and the main street of Tuncurry in the CBD and opposite the Bellevue Hotel and across from the Tuncurry Post Office.

I was 10 years old and in mid 1984 my Uncle George approached Ken Baggs, who back then, owned a wool and shoe shop in the main street and was running the Tuncurry Promotions Committee, to support his plan to have our Carnival move somewhere into the Tuncurry township. Uncle George and Ken identified the vacant blocks and Ken agreed to make approaches to all relevant parties, including the Council, to gain the necessary approvals. And so it came to be for the December/January holidays in 1984.

We worked there for about 3 or 4 years. Each year Ken, by then a strong supporter of the Carnival and a close friend of the family, recognized its value as a local attraction and tourist entertainment over the school holidays. would seek the necessary approvals from Ted, the RSL Club and the Council. Then as the Carnival became a regular annual feature it

was obvious the vacant blocks had outgrown their use and Uncle George again came to Ken seeking his support for a move down to John Wright Park. We negotiated with the Council and so we moved to its now permanent and ideal location.

As we, the kids, have grown and had families of our own, so too has our Carnival. We now have four generations of the Pink Family and 11 small businesses now operating within the Carnival.

Uncle George passed in October 2022 after a very long hard fought battle with cancer. He

loved it here in Tuncurry, fishing out of his boat and socializing with family and friends.

We have developed strong ties and friendships over the years, conducting business with so many of the local businesses, getting materials and services and creating friends forever. I don't think there is a restaurant or shop on either side of the bridge we haven't patronized.

We spent days water skiing at Wallamba, swimming with all our friends in the lake and many mornings pretending we could surf on Tuncurry beach. Then there was Fays movie theatre on a wet night with Pot Black fun parlour as another venue to enjoy.

We've had two weddings here in Tuncurry and Forster. In 1986 Glen and Chris, who

worked with Uncle George for many years, were married on the Dodgem car track on the original site with Ken and Glenda Baggs as guests. Then in 2020 Connor Pink (Aaron and Sharon's oldest son) married Reanna at the Green Cathedral.

My oldest daughter Brielle was born at the Manning Base Hospital in late December 1997 and then 10 days later Glen and Jayze had Jack Pink at the Hospital as well.

Charlie and Cathy Pink, our Nan and Pop, used to come here and work with us before they retired. Nan loved nothing more than her early morning swim at the rock pool.

Councillors endorsed the reappointment of members to the Audit, Risk and Improvement Committee and will ensure renewal dates are staggered in the future to ensure knowledge is not lost when members change

All Councils are required under the Local Government Act 1993 to have an ARIC from 4 June 2022. The objective of MidCoast Council's Audit, Risk and Improvement Committee is to provide independent assurance to Council by monitoring, reviewing and providing advice about the organisation's governance processes, compliance, risk management and control frameworks, external accountability obligations and overall performance.

4. \$7.6 million spent on road network since July

Maintenance and replacement of transport assets represent a significant proportion of Council's total operational budget.

A quarterly report presented to the meeting, showed Council's year-to-date expenditure on operation and maintenance of the transport network including commitments (as of 26 November 2024), was \$7,640,502.

This represents approximately 44% of the current budget. Excluding commitments, expenditure is approximately 1.3% above the project budget for the period.

Since 1 July 2024 (21 weeks) a total of 2,410 customer requests have been received for Operations North and South. The average response time is six days with the majority of requests responded to within the 10-day target of the Customer Charter.

Taree produces the largest number of customer requests. This aligns with the known backlog of defects on transport infrastructure from historical underfunding.

The request data by issue type shows that almost half of the requests fit into 'road surface' or 'other' categories (including potholes). Footpath defects, signage and rural road grading concerns each account for over 10% of requests. Lower proportions of requests relate to kerb and gutter and street sweeping.

5. Dredging of the Lower Myall **River. Corrie Channel & Eastern** Channel

Tenders received for the dredging of the Lower Myall River, Corrie Channel and Eastern Channel at Tea Gardens were declined.

It was resolved Council would enter negotiations with anyone (whether or not the person was a tenderer) with the view of entering into a contract, to identify opportunities to reduce costs, confirm project funding and best manage the project risks.

Walk with the Pelicans over Wallis Lake



MidCoast Council is constructing a new 120-metre section of suspended boardwalk over Wallis Lake in Forster

The new work will extend the much-loved Memorial Drive Pelican Boardwalk that forms part of the scenic Forster Tuncurry Foreshore

Walk. It provides an exciting new experience for residents and visitors to the area as it will be built out over the water

"We have been working on improvements to the walk over the past few years, with funding rom the Australian Government's Local Roads, munity and Infrastructure Grants helping to replace the deteriorated timber decking in the existing boardwalk back in 2022," said Amanda Hatton, Manager Strategy and

'We have also recently completed a new lowlevel landing to provide a safe, ramped access into the water for the community for swimming and paddleboarding.

The new section of boardwalk will be accessible to people of all ages and abilities. It will provide an excellent vantage point for water-based sports and other major events throughout the year such as the New Year's Eve fireworks display.

"We are working with the Forster Local Aboriginal Land Council regarding the cultural significance of the foreshore area.

"We will provide interpretive signage with information on the cultural significance of the site, the ecological values of the waterways and the history of the area, including the punt which used to ferry passengers and vehicles across the lake prior to the construction of the Wallis Lake Bridge," Ms Hatton said. Work is expected to start in mid-2025 and take around six months to complete, weathe

permitting. The sand beach access to the Breckenridge Channel and the carpark may be impacted



Each year ahead of summer, Fish Aggregating Devices (FADs or fish magnets) are strategically placed along the NSW coast to provide reliable locations for fishers, especially those targeting the much sought-after Dolphinfish (Mahi Mahi)

The FADS remain in the water until early winter when they are removed for routine maintenance, including cleaning, fitting the GPS systems on individual FAD buoys and replacing anchors, chains and ropes.

FADs are a NSW Government initiative run by the Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD) with support from the Recreational Fishing Trust.

Recreational fishers are encouraged to keep up to date on FAD deployments, coordinates and responsible fishing tips on the FishSmart app or at: www.dpi.nsw.gov.au/fishing/recreational/ resources/fish-aggregating-devices

They are also reminded to check the latest marine weather forecast before heading offshore to wet a line. Many FADs are placed fai from shore. Please ensure your boat is suitable for offshore fishing.

NSW is home to more than a million recreational fishers. The industry contributes some \$3.4 billion in economic activity each year and support the equivalent of 14,000 full-time

Manning - Great Lakes Police District Update

School holidays are upon us and with this comes a great influx of visitors to our vonderful area Unfortunately, holiday periods can also see an increase in property theft from holiday accommodation - particularly of bikes - so it is timely I provide a few simple crime prevention tips that can ninimise the chance of you becoming a victim of crime!

Crime prevention: **Caravan Parks**

When you arrive at a Caravan

- Ask the manager about safety and security in the area
- Get to know your neighbours
- and who belongs there • Secure your outdoor equipment with a good
- quality chain and lock Secure your vehicles with wheel and hitch
- clamps DO...photograph, video and keep an accurate

description of all your vehicles and valuables (particularly serial numbers)

DO...mark your valuables with an identification number such as your driver's licence.

DO...keep all your doors and windows locked, even when you're nearby

DO...take all your valuables with you when you leave the park or area.

DO NOT...leave bikes, eskies (particularly with alcohol), surfboards, wet suits, fishing gear or any other recreational equipment unattended outside

DO NOT...leave equipment - especially bikes on top of vehicles or boats without chaining/ locking them



DO NOT...leave washing, shoes or wet swimmers and towels outside overnight. DO NOT...leave spare keys hidden outside the

caravan when going out DO NOT...leave things of value on display inside your vehicle or caravan (such as mobile phones,

laptops, cameras, handbags or wallets). Going out?

• Leave a light or radio on to try and give the appearance you're inside

• Make sure you key lock all your doors, windows and roof hatches.

Turn on your alarm

• If you can't take valuables with you, secure them in a safe or ask the Park Office to store your valuables in the office safe for you. Protect your bike!

• Always record the serial number, brand and

model of your bicycle and accessories and take a photo

Never leave your bicycle unattended and unsecured. Alwavs use a

good quality bike lock/chain when parking your bicycle away from home. Always lock the

wheels and frame to a secure object Always park your bicvcle in a well lit and populated area.

• Where possible, secure your bicycle inside your holiday accommodation

If you have become the victim of theft or crime immediately contact the Police (you can report the crime immediately on 131 444) and your Caravan Park Reception Office

Speeding, fatigue and alcohol are the three main causes of death and injury on our roads, so please remember:

• Don't drive at inappropriate or excessive speed



moving here as a young child from Sydney. He is a Civil Engineer with a Port Macquarie based consultancy business

Michael has served on a number of local sporting committees including Forster-Tuncurry Touch, Cape Hawke Surf Club and Great Lakes Junior Cricket, as well as Team Manager for Grand Master Fay Shacklock (Taekwondo) since 2016. Most notably he has been President of the Forster Aquatic Swimming Club for the last 17 consecutive years.

Background of the Tuncurry Forster Jockey Club

• In 1980, Norm Roberts, John Darcy and Don Creighton formed the Tuncurry Forster Jockey Club. In 1984 Les Dunk and Rusty Begg also joined the board. It was not until 1985 that Norm Roberts arrived at a meeting and said, "I have found some land which will be suitable" that the Tuncurry Racecourse became a reality.

• The Development Application for the subdivision of the Racecourse Estate in Tuncurry was submitted to Council (then named Great Lakes Council) and consisted of 34 blocks, which went on sale from \$25,000 to \$35,000. Rusty Begg was made Trustee of the land and Norm Roberts took on the role of the Project Manager

 During the next 15 years the club members worked on a voluntary basis to organise the sale of the sand dredged from the lake to finance the building of a racetrack.

• With the election of a new committee in 2001 came the first DA submitted to Council. These plans included infrastructure for the building of Stewarts Towers jockeys' change rooms, race viewing rooms and betting rings.

• At this stage, the club was operating as a non-TAB track and held two social meetings to raise funds for a defibrillator for Forster Hospital. These meetings helped the club gain momentum.

• Shortly afterward, the Tuncurry Forster Jockey Club was officially granted its license in October 2008. This marked the beginning of its journey toward becoming a TABrecognised venue.

"Achieving our TAB license was a significant milestone and marked the beginning of a new chapter for us." said Julie Manning, Vice President/Secretarv. "The license brought increased prestige, as well as improvements in the quality of our track, horses, trainers, and jockeys. From here, we went from strength to strength.

The Tuncurry Forster Jockey Club became the last club in New South Wales to be registered with a racing license. Before this, it had been 80 years since another race club had been granted such a license

• The club continues to add more infrastructure for the growing crowds. By February 2022, the club completed work on - a 20 by 12m shed cover for the public seating area that holds

230-250 people with large television screens on either end; an extension of the male jockey rooms; split levels at the front of the pavilion to allow more people to view the races and an extra 20 horse ties to the existing 100.

• On 12 February 2023, the club hosted a NSW Country Championship Qualifier for the very first time. One reason to be awarded this big event is its 'heavy 10' rating for the track (a rating signifying a track that copes very well under any conditions)

• On 29 September 2023, the club was awarded Country TAB Race Club of the Year.

• On 4 December 2023, the internal dirt road is sealed and Chapman's Road is widened to allow easier access for club users and safer access to the large dam inside the racetrack for fire trucks in emergency situations.

MidCoast Council is making significant progress toward meeting the state-mandated Food Organics and Garden Organics (FOGO) requirements, set to be in place by 2030.

In a decisive move at its meeting on 11 December, Council approved a contract with NALG Envirotech Pty Ltd to deliver the FOGO service and mandated the appointment of an independent Construction Quality Assurance Officer to oversee the development of a stateof-the-art FOGO processing facility near the Tuncurry Waste Management Centre.

David Rees, MidCoast Council's Waste Manager, highlighted the critical need to comply with the Protection of the Environment Legislation Amendment Bill 2024, which will enforce strict mandates and penalties for non-compliance.

"Failure to meet these obligations could result in fines of up to \$500,000 per offence and \$50,000 daily for ongoing breaches. That's why it's essential we get this right. Our focus is on delivering a reliable, cost-effective facility that reduces landfill, benefits the environment, and serves our community well into the future," Mr. Rees said

The Tuncurry facility, to be designed, built, and operated by NALG Envirotech in partnership with global waste technology leader Kanadevia Inova HZI), will be one of the st in Australasia to utilise hybrid organic waste technology. This nnovative facility will process up to 95,000 connes of organic waste annually in its first stage, scheduled to be operational by 2027. The facility will generate renewable energy equivalent to powering 1,300 homes, reduce greenhouse gas emissions and earn valuable carbon

By diverting organic waste from landfill, the facility will produce certified compost, biogas for electricity generation, and potentially biochar, firmly establishing MidCoast Council as a leader in the circular economy and decarbonisation. Furthermore, the facility will support neighbouring councils and businesses in meeting the 2030 mandate, setting a new benchmark for waste management innovation in Australia.

"This project is more than just meeting compliance. It's about creating a sustainable future by turning waste into resources, reducing emissions, and contributing to energy generation. We're proud to be at the forefront of this transformation, whilst ensuring the MidCoast Community receives the most costeffective service possible for the mandated FOGO service" Mr. Rees added.

MidCoast Council's commitment to this cutting-edge facility underscores its dedication to delivering environmental, economic, and community benefits, setting an inspiring example for councils across the country.





Local Identity - Marty Tooze

Marty was born in Newcastle Hospital, long before it was torn down to make way for the ritzy high-rise developments that now stand on the precious real estate that the hospital once inhabited. Marty's father was a boilermaker and his mother worked numerous jobs. one of which was as a factory worker for the now extinct YY Cordial Company. With the help of his grandfather, Marty's father built the family home in Birmingham Gardens, a stones' throw from where the first foundation stone was laid in 1971 for what is now the University of Newcastle. Marty is the youngest of three children. "being blessed to have both a sister and brother who both helped to guide me during my younger years and continue to do so

Marty considers himself to be extremely fortunate to be part of a blended family. "My gorgeous partner of three years has a son and a daughter with whom I'm thankful to say I have great relationships with."

As a young man, Marty had aspirations of becoming a wood technology teacher as he had an eye for detail and a keen interest in cabinet making and all things that could be made from timber. He also thought that he would make a pretty cool teacher. Alas, this was not to be. It was 1987, interest rates were 18.5% and unemployment was through the roof. So, at the end of year 11 an opportunity came before him to become an apprentice Civil Engineering Construction Carpenter. After seeking advice from his father and school wood working teacher, both advised that he should grab the opportunity with both hands as it was guaranteed work for four years – something that was very hard to come by at the time. It certainly was a far cry from teaching or cabinet making, but four years of full-time employment had allowed Marty to purchase a snazzy looking 4WD and bank enough money to fulfil his dream of travelling around Australia. The car was packed with carpentry tools and of course a PA and guitar. "The world had finally opened up for me. I was treasuring the new sights of

Marty revelled in the travel experiences and loved meeting new, and interesting people. After settling in Cairns and working within his trade for a couple of months, he secured a job on the largest sailing catamaran in the southern hemisphere owned and operated by one of the few Australian companies operating out of Cairns Harbour at the time - Ocean Spirit Cruises. Here Marty wore many hats. deckhand, lifeguard, AND entertainer! "It was probably the greatest job that I've had in my

life. Meeting and talking to people from all walks of life, diving The Great Barrier Reef, and really honing my skills not just as a performer, but as an entertainer.

Family illness unfortunately necessitated a move back home where Marty picked up work in the **Civil Engineering** and Earthworks world. He also spent some time as a chainman (surveyor's assistant) travelling the state and the southern patches of Queensland facilitating the set out for the North Coast Rail Loops, imperative to today's free flowing railway movements between the two states.

"Being blessed with the upcoming birth of my first child, it was time to find something that

was more permanent and stable." Back to the Council he went, starting within the Concrete Construction crew, then moving through to become a Team Leader of Road Construction. Marty then applied for a job within the office providing construction plans for driveway crossovers and undertaking the inspections of same. This position was a good "filler" for Marty whilst he undertook further study by correspondence and eventually received a Cert IV in Civil Engineering Design. This helped him acquire the role of Development Engineer that he stayed in for 15 years assessing and inspecting all things development related. This was a position that Marty really enjoyed as it made him feel as though he was giving back to his community by having some influence in the type of developments that benefit our beautiful surrounds

Marty has only recently moved on from this position in the Council and now operates his own business (very similar to his role within Council) where he assesses and inspects developments within our local area as well as further afield. Marty's new company is known as Down to Earth Development Services "and that is exactly what you get – an honest, quality service that everyday people can understand and hopefully benefit from. It's an exciting time and I can say with much gratitude that it is really taking off."

Marty was very fortunate to be exposed and ounded by a broad spectrum of music in his youth. His father played guitar as well as his brother, but his biggest influence, supporter, and fan was his fathers' step-uncle. Known to Marty as Uncle Boy ("Boy" being a nickname he was given as a child), he had become a

step-brother to his grandmother through the tragedies of the second world war. He owned a large portion of land near the old church that Marty's family had moved into at Boolambayte

when he was about 5 years old. 'Boy' loved the romanticism of the steam train era and was drawn to artists such as Jimmy Rogers who was one of the first white blues players to sing of the alure of travel, and a life of wandering and adventure. Hank Williams, Slim Dusty and Chad Morgan were other favourites of his which became part of the founding fabric of Marty's early exposure to the wonders of music.

As a 'young Marty', he was involved in the Bulahdelah Country Music Club and often went in

competitions as was the "done thing" of the day. He was fortunate enough to win a few trophies and even a brand-new acoustic guitar which was a big deal for him at the time. "I still think it had more to do with the elaborate cowboy shirt that my auntie had made for me to wear that day, than the performance I nervously struggled through!'

Marty has always been keen to help other people in need within his community and being able to play guitar and sing was a great way to not only bring people together but to also help raise funding for whatever was desperately needed at the time. Marty quite frequently would donate his time to play at nursing homes and charity events for those in need. "The best thing that I have ever done with my music hands down, was to organise a concert for a friend of mine who was suffering from Multiple Sclerosis. This horrific disease, along with many other things, took away my friend's ability to talk. At the time, there was a computer device that with the help of laser technology, was capable of helping my friend communicate with his loved ones. This device, however, was far too expensive for any friends or family to obtain and so, a charity fundraiser was formed called "Help a Mate Communicate". The aim of the night was to raise \$4,000 to put towards the device. I was overjoyed and overwhelmed by the community's support when the final tally came in at over \$12,000. To me this has been my greatest achievement for so many reasons."

It brought together the outstanding generosity of a small community, and several talented musicians who not only donated their time. equipment and their talents but many of

Marty's musical brethren also found it in their hearts to "kick the tin" as well. "I will forever hold undying gratitude to all of those who helped organise and make that night the success that it undoubtedly was." Marty's friends' name was Lee Johnson, and his loving family set up a trust account for all the donations raised which services any individual within the local area that requires some form of medical assistance through the Lee Johnson Fund. Lee had the most aggressive form of MS and tragically he passed away at a terribly young age. "I'm pleased to say that he still visits me in my dreams, and we go on boyish adventures together - just like the old days." Apart from his music, Marty enjoys surfing, being in the saltwater, swimming and bushwalking, exploring, and being places that He's never been before.

About our area, Marty said he loves its natural beauty and the sense of connect to country that natural beauty provides.

Marty's favourite saying is "Try and live with a grateful heart and appreciate the beautiful things that surround us".

Long term friend, Leo Quinn said this about Marty...

"I have been fortunate and privileged to have had Marty Tooze as one of my best friends for over 30 years. In all my life, I've never met anyone quite like him. He is unique and once you meet him, you are highly unlikely to forget

He has an uncanny knack of putting people at ease and making them feel special. All my family and friends that have met him want to adopt him as family.

From personal experience, many is the time that he has been unselfishly supportive of me in my times of need.

He's a wonderful father to his children, Tanayah and Nick, and the exceptional love and care he has lavished upon them shines through in who they have become.

I am proud to have him as a friend and love him like a brother. I think everyone deserves a Marty Tooze in their lives.

Our Local Wildlife

The Mosquito

When people think of deadly critters in our natural environment, most will think of sharks, crocodiles, snakes and maybe spiders. But the deadliest animal on the planet is actually much smaller, the mosquito.

Worldwide mosquitos spread viruses such as Malaria, West Nile, Yellow Fever, Kunjin,

and Zika. In Australia Japanese Encephalitis Ross River, Barmah Forest, Murray River Encephalitis and Dengue Fever viruses are all mosquito borne with predictions that increasing chemical pesticide resistance and limate change will only exacerbate the threat they pose

So significant is the problem of mosquito borne diseases that CSIRO scientists (in collaboration with private companies) are devoting considerable resources to developing biological controls in

which some species of male mosquitos are genetically engineered to become sterile and thus limit their species reproduction.

While this is promising research, there is a lot that we can do in the meantime to limit mosquito populations around our homes.

Encouraging and protecting microbats around your house is one highly effective intervention. A single microbat can eat up to half its body weight or 1,200 mosquitos in one night while larger microbats can eat that many mosquitoes in an hour. Many microbats are dependent on tree hollows for their nest-spaces so putting up specialised microbat nestboxes in suitable places around your home, in shaded spaces that do not get direct sun, is a highly effective mozzie control strategy.

We placed one microbat nesting box on the south side of our house and others in some

to be outside at night and watch them doing their rapid aerial flybys as they guard us from these biting pests. Microbat droppings are tiny, have no smell and do not carry diseases. However. microbats are vulnerable to sometimes chasing mosquitos into our houses. in which case, leaving the doors open should allow them to safely exit. They can

French Historian Bernard Feutry is asking Forster readers for their help in contacting the family of Roval Australian Air Force (RAAF) airman Henry "Harry" Roland Train who fought in France during World War II.

Pilot officer Harry Train was shot down over Eppe-Sauvage on 7 May 1942. He survived the plane crash and was hidden by local school teacher André Dewelde before being betrayed to the Germans and sent to Dulag Luft - a transit camp for prisoners of war in Frankfurt. He was later sent to the infamous Stalag Luft jail at Zagan in Poland. Andre was later killed

crashes in his region of Avesnois in France for the last 13 years. He is also a friend of the association of Squadron 460 RAAF.

"There were 34 crashes between 1940 and 1945 with 116 airmen killed - six Americans, 69 British, 10 Australians, 13 Canadians, five New Zealanders and 13 French. A number of airmen were never located or escaped unscathed or were taken prisoner.

On this date "A memorial dedicated to the 116 airmen killed in our region will be inaugurated


